Subject: Confederate Command Report

Past Events, Calico – Another good event in the desert. Weather was some of the best I've seen in the past few years. Fairly warm, but a bit windy. On the Confederate side about 100 soldiers took the field. Amongst the units there were: Hampton's Legion, 8th Louisiana (Cos E & F), 8th Alabama, 10th Virginia, 4th Texas (from Las Vegas), McGowan's Sharpshooters, 2nd Kentucky, and the Washington Artillery. We also had some singletons show up, a couple of CS Marines and a Sharpshooter from the ACWA in the Central Valley and a dismount from Utah. Thanks to those that attended. Good battles were held in the Silver Bowl and at the School House. Thanks to LC Peca and Major Style for their good work with movement of the troops, along with artillery support from Major Collins. If you notice, I leave the great majority of tactical determinations to these Brigade Commanders. I provide an overview as to what I would like them to do, and let them implement it. And yes I know, we need to work a bit on getting few more Yankees to go down (i.e., last battle on Sunday at the bridge), but overall and on average they did take hits satisfactorily for the weekend. Kudos to Pvt Don Nobles of McGowan's Sharpshooters. During public hours he made bullets using lead and a bullet form. There was always a group of public around watching. I very much want to encourage this type of education and interaction with the

public and soldiers too. Again, with fire and hot lead, be safe. There were some minor glitches at the event. Remember, when we park on the north side, don't park in the areas along the road or in the lot to our north. This is for the employees of the park that work in businesses on the north side of town. Also, make sure your camp area is cleaned up before you go home. That way those that stay over don't have to clean up your mess.

Annual Rifle Raffle – Capt Tom Atkins of Co E, 8th Louisiana was the winner of the Rifle Raffle held at Calico. To be eligible for entry into the rifle raffle, you must be an ACWS Member for 2012 and have attended at least one ACWS Event in 2012 (Calico, Costa Mesa, SMR, etc). You earn one ticket for each day you attend an event. Additional tickets can be earned if you do 'extra' duties as directed by Command, such as guard mount. Names for attendance at ACWS events are taken from Morning Reports submitted by each Company to Brigade then to Division Staff at each event, each day. If your Company does not submit the Morning Report, you do not get credit for attending. ACWS membership will be drawn from the listing provided by the ACWS Membership Chair. At the end of the year (December/January) the two lists will be combined to determine attendance and membership at the end of the reenactment year. This listing will be sent to Company Commanders for them to ensure those that attended are on the listing. The raffle itself will be held at the first ACWS event in the New Year (generally Calico).

Safety Testing – A goodly number of safety tests were turned in and cards/passes stamped at the Calico event. The Division Staff will keep a listing of those passing and will use this to stamp cards at future events. Membership cards and day passes with endorsements will be checked at each ACWS event. As a reminder, if you go to another PACWR associated unit event (i.e., Fresno, Mariposa, etc) your safety test taken with the ACWS is good with their unit. A listing of test passers has been/will be sent to each Company Commander/Contact so they know who within their unit have passed the tests.

Safety Testing for Mounted Troops - For those mounted members who attend ACWS/PACWR events, there is a required test for you and your mount. I have asked LC Peca to identify a person to perform these tests. Basically the test is done to ensure the rider has good control of his mount, the mount is not gun shy, etc. Once this test is taken and passed, it need not be retaken unless there is a safety issue or the rider or mount do not attend an event for one year. Each horse ridden must pass the test (i.e., Pvt. Jones does a test with White Horse and passes. If Pvt. Jones brings his new horse, Black Horse, to an event, Black horse also needs to pass the test too.).

Recruiting Station - The ACWS is working to reinvigorate a Recruiting Station at ACWS events. Here units can place recruiting flyers and such. So plan on bringing your unit's recruiting flyers to the next event.

Upcoming Reenactment Activities:

St. Catherine's Military School (Anaheim) will be held on March 24th and 25th, sponsored/hosted by the Washington Artillery and supported by ACWS. This is an event that is more living history and less reenactment. If your unit desires to attend, please let me know at your earliest. And if attending, could each unit's commander send a few questions (4-5) along with answers so that I might forward to School Question Coordinator? These will be consolidated with other units which will be given to students to ask your members. I am trying to get more unit-oriented information out of those young skulls full of mush, rather than the generic, 'What did you do before the war?' All reenactors and civilians pay \$2.00 registration fee. ACWS members do not have to complete the release but must present a card. Non-ACWS members must complete the release. The red ticket

is use as identification and must be presented at Muster. Save the other half of the red ticket for the raffle. The red ticket is also used for the Saturday night raffle and is not to be surrendered.

Prado Dam (Chino) - Held on March 31st and April 1st. Sponsored by the SCCWA and supported by the ACWS. For those that are ACWS members, get in free with your membership card, otherwise it is \$10. Registration fee is \$2. Set up is after noon on March 30th. Information on the event can be found at <http://sccwa.com/toc.htm>. This link has a registration form, info on RV parking, etc. Our good friend Lt Col Keith Harriott will be in command of Confederate Forces.

Fairview Park (Costa Mesa) - To be held on April 14th and 15th (so get your tax paperwork done before the event). Setup can begin after noon on April 13. There are two battles each day. It will be held is 2 weeks after Prado and 1 week after Easter, so it will not conflict with any other events. KOCI 101.5 radio will be setting up a satellite web cam and a live broadcast so the event can be heard and seen on their website and radio station. Please make sure you add this event to your event calendar; you don't want to miss it! Items of interest include: breakfast available Saturday & Sunday; Saturday night dinner; Saturday Night dance; Sunday raffle (after Sunday's first battle); the battle field will be mowed this year and horses are welcomed. FYI, because of the openness of the event site, each unit/individual needs to be prepared for Guard/Fire Mount on Saturday night.

Glorietta Pass, New Mexico Territory (Near Santa Fe, NM) - To be held from May 3rd to 6th. Info can be found at <http://newmexicocwcommcongress.org/>. The battles include Glorietta and Apache Canyon. Event to be held at El Rancho de las Golondrinas Living History Museum, which is about 20 miles southwest of Santa Fe, New Mexico. From the general LA area, figure an 830 mile trip (about a day and a half of driving). If you register before March 15 the fee is \$10. After the 15th the fee will be \$15.

Gettysburg 150th - From past discussions it appears there will be three groups associated with the ACWS going back to Gettysburg in July 2013 for the 150th Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg. There will be infantry, dismounted cavalry, and artillery groups planning on attending. Keith Harriott will be commanding a composite group of infantry which will be falling in with our friends back east in the 1st Arkansas/Trans Mississippi Brigade. We may also have a few rifles from Britain and Italy falling in with us. For those going we may ask that you bring a few extra rounds/caps to give to them as they probably won't be able to bring them on the plane. According to Scott Peca, a group of dismounts will also be going. Bob Hayes of Moody's Battery will also be going. If you might want to go with one of these groups, contact them for more information. I am helping with the paperwork for the infantry unit, so contact me if you have any questions, wanting to join, etc.

IRISH CIVIL WAR MUSIC

In stage entertainment, the favorite butt for mid-nineteenth century American comics and singers was the Negro, in "black face" minstrel form. But following close behind were Paddy O'Reilly and Mick McGuire—the "stage Irishmen." Typical of "comic Irish" songs with a Civil War motif was "Who Will Care for Mickey Now?" sung to the tune of "Who Will Care for Mother Now."

The Irish, naturally, responded to the derogatory stereotypes with indignation and, in New York City and Boston, the Democratic Party. With their wonderful national tradition of song and dance behind them, Irish singers and comics began to take the stage in their own behalf. Irish songwriters and parodists met each musical indignity with a score of replies. Some even employed the character of the "stage Irish" to make their point. A pre-Civil War song, "No Irish Need Apply," is typical:

I'm a decent boy just landed from the town of Ballyfad,
I want a situation and I want it very bad.
I have seen employment advertised, " 'Tis just the thing," says I,
But the dirty spalpeen ended with "NO IRISH NEED APPLY."

The song goes on to relate how the prospective employer was convinced that he had erred:

I couldn't stand it longer, so a-hold of him I took,
And gave him such a welting as he'd get at Donnybrook.
He hollered "Millia Murther" and to get away did try,
And swore hed' never write again, "NO IRISH NEED APPLY."

With the outbreak of hostilities, the Irish responded with enthusiasm, which turned into heroism in the stress of battle. Songs of the period identified the Union struggle against slavery with Ireland's centuries-old battle for freedom and national independence:

The war trump has sounded, our rights are in danger,
Shall the brave sons of Erin be deaf to the call,
When Freedom demands of both native and stranger
Their aid, lest the greatest of nations shall fall?

. . . Oh long may our flags wave in Union together,
And the harp of green Erin still kiss the same breeze,
And brave every storm that beclouds the fair weather,
'Til our Harp, like the Stars, floats o'er rivers and seas.

Songs of Pat's courage under fire and of the martyrdom of the Irish, as "Pat Murphy of the Irish Brigade," were widely sung and remembered. The New York 69th and other Irish regiments were celebrated in songs, along with leaders like Corcoran, Ellsworth, and Meagher. There were songs celebrating Irish bravery, Irish loyalty, and the special regiments of Irishmen who marched off to war together. In 1861 they sang of Colonel Meagher and his newly-organized Brigade:

You gallant sons of Erin's isle, attend to what I say,
A brother, driven to exile, is up alive today;
He is the good Hiberian blood that never frets nor fears,
He has arranged a new brigade of Irish volunteers.

But three years later, in 1864, the song of the Irish Brigade was somewhat different:

. . . They went forth to die in the swamps of the South,
And in the sunny green glade,
Lie the soldiers who fought in the Irish Brigade.

The pride of the Irish as a people, as a nation, as a group subjected to indignity and discrimination, and as loyal patriots faithful to their newly adopted land was expressed in scores of songs. Many were sung in the music halls of New York where Irish performers played such an important role. One of the best-known of such singers was Joe English, whose nightly turns covered a wide range of topical fare. In "Paddy and the Know-Nothings," Joe English ridicules anti-Irish prejudice, has warm words for Irish heroism, and winds up, naturally, singing the praises of "Little Mac" (Gen. MacClellan):

And when the war's over and peace is restored,
And our brothers down South to the Union come back,
We'll join hands together and vote Democratic,
And for our next President elect the brave Little Mac.

With the Confederacy taking an Irish song, "The Irish Jaunting Car," and changing it into a Southern anthem, "Bonnie Blue Flag," it was natural for Irish Unionists to attempt to reclaim the melody. "The Bonnie Green Flag" was an obvious answer to the Confederate song, and also made some comments about Northern discrimination against the Irish at the same time:

There are many around don't know what they're at,
When they laugh and they jeer and make game of poor Pat;
With his sprig of shillaleh and shamrock so green:
There are others you know oft tell a big lie,
When they say that the Irish need not apply;

But when soldiers they want, in the front there is seen,
The sprig of shillaleh and shamrock so green.

Only a few of these songs of the Irish and their fighting brigades have survived the passage of years, but history tells us that the songs of Irish bravery and devotion in the Civil War do not overstate the case. “Pat Murphy” is one of the few which an occasional singer will recall from a distant and hazy folk memory—and with it the “Irish Brigade” still marches into battle, its bright flag of green waving high alongside the Stars and Stripes.
